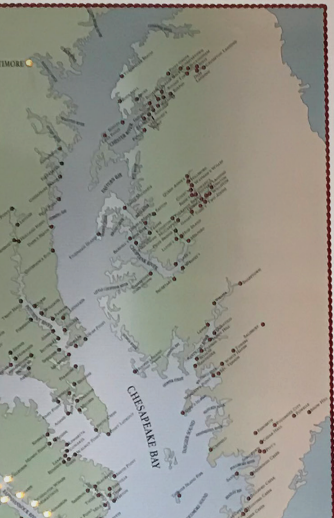

AGAINST THE TIDE: THE ASTONISHING LIFE OF A BLACK AMERICAN ENTREPRENEUR

The Steamboat Era saw few African American entrepreneurs succeed in the risky business of steamboat ownership. Yet Hansford C. Bayton defied the odds. He became the captain and owner of four excursion and mail delivery steamboats that sailed the Rappahannock River in the late 1800's and early 1900's.

Bayton would acquire wealth as well as the respect of both whites and blacks. His is a story that illuminates a time in American history when the progress of newly freed men was stymied by the rise of Jim Crow laws and the Ku Klux Klan.

The Board, staff, and I are excited to share with you the Annual Report for 2022.

Before trains, cars, trucks, and airplanes existed, waterways were used for travel. They carried people and goods from one place to another. The steam-powered boats could travel at the astonishing speed of up to five miles per hour, and they soon revolutionized travel and trade and dominated the waterways for more than a century.

Steamboats no longer travel the nation's waterways, but they will always remain one of the United States' most important technological advances. During their day, they ruled the nation's rivers and bays, and nowhere was this truer than in the Chesapeake Bay and its tributary rivers. The Steamboat Era Museum is proud to be the preeminent repository of information about this important historical snapshot of maritime history and culture.

Perhaps most importantly, next year we celebrate the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Museum, and I'm pleased to report that our mission and focus have never been stronger. Our Board recently completed a rigorous strategic planning exercise—something that will guide the organization as it moves through its anniversary year and beyond. Many thanks to Board members Ollen Richey and Rick Metzger who, along with our exceptional Executive Director, Steve Humphrey, spearheaded this important effort.

We continue to enhance our educational approach, with programming and interactive exhibits that provide fun and entertainment for the entire family. Our youth education programs, led by Board member Mary Ann McKay, continue to excite young people from local schools, and an exciting new exhibit relating to children in the Steamboat Era is being added to the Museum as I write.

Other upcoming projects include a revised publication of the story of Hansford Bayton, an African American steamboat owner, entrepreneur, and civic leader. *Against the Tide*, written by Captain Bayton's great granddaughter, tells you how he navigated Jim Crow laws to run a successful fleet of steamers—until arson literally sent his business up in flames.

Our flagship annual event, the Crab Festival, went off without a hitch this past year, led by our incomparable Past President and Crab Festival committee chair, Cay Bradley, who is regrettably leaving the Board this year, due to term limits. Nonetheless, she'll once again steer the Crab Fest this September. We hope you'll buy tickets for this popular event when they become available. The Board is actively looking for sponsors and raffle item donations, so let us know if you'd like to contribute.

Our unique museum shop is well stocked, and we are looking forward to another successful Holiday Marketplace later in the year. And, of course, our exceptional flagship exhibits, such as the Potomac Pilothouse—the largest surviving remnant from a Chesapeake Bay steamboat—continues to delight visitors throughout our exhibition season, which began on April 1st. Of this restoration, Chesapeake Bay historian Richard H. Burgess, wrote, "It was as if the structure was still on the steamer." If you haven't seen this wonderful example of hands-on history, we hope you'll visit the Museum soon.

All in all, the Steamboat Era Museum is poised to enter its next quarter century with a full complement of dedicated volunteers and supporters...like you. FOUNDERS OF THE MUSEUM HONORED

On Saturday evening, May 14, two plaques were unveiled and dedicated in memory of Anne Long McClintock and Dr. Lee and Teensa Williams all original founders of the museum. Families and friends of the honorees were present at the reception.

DR. LEE AND TEENSA WILLIAMS

Dr. Williams was very familiar with the Potomac. He first visited the pilothouse, at age five, as a passenger in 1929. After swallowing a penny, his mother called Captain Archibald Long for help. Deciding the penny would pass on its own, he invited the young boy to visit the wheelhouse, a very special honor.

Ninety years later in 2019, at age ninety-five, he revisited the wheelhouse and once again turned the wheel.

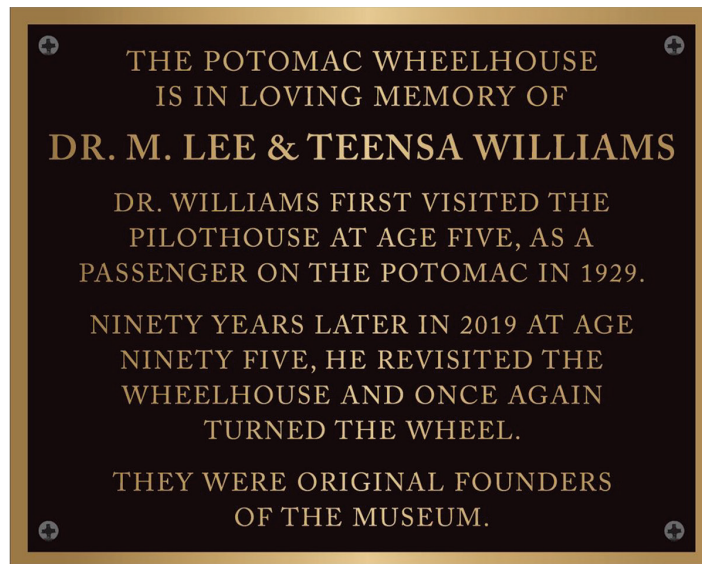
Dr. and Mrs. Williams were original founders and long supporters of the museum. Both passed away in the summer of 2022.

ANNE LONG McCLINTOCK

Anne Long McClintock was the granddaughter of Archibald Long, the longest serving captain of the Potomac. The museum and the restoration of the pilothouse were close to Anne's heart, and she worked hard to make each successful.

One of Anne's greatest joys was the publication of her short stories about the Steamboat Era. Working with former museum Executive Director Barbara Brecher, she collected her stories written for local newspapers and, with Brecher's design support, *We Are Who We Are Because Steamboats Were* was published by the museum in 2014. The first printing sold out in one day at the museum's Holiday Marketplace.

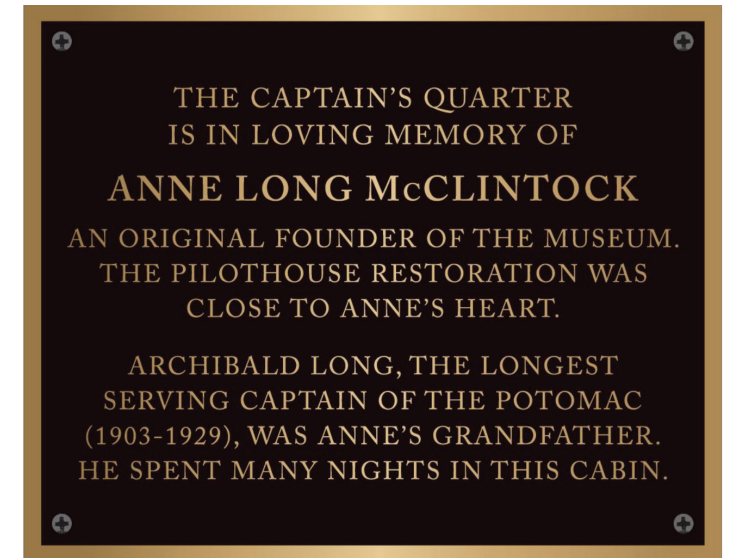
Anne passed away in January 2020, but she was present in May 2019 when the restored pilothouse was raised over the museum and installed in the exhibition hall.

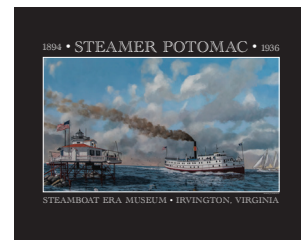
NEW BOARDS ON THE DECK AND HANDICAP RAMP

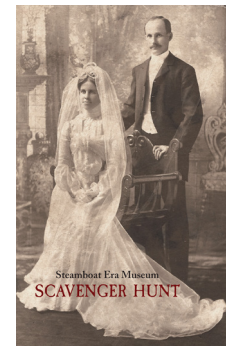

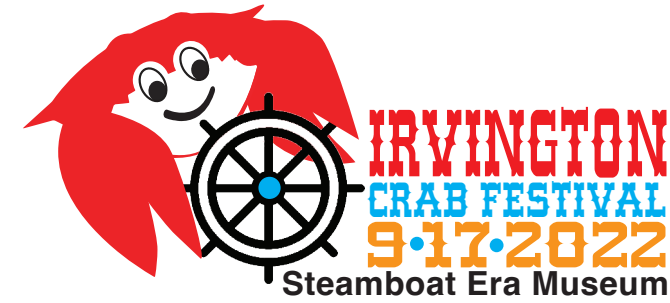
FRIDAY MORNING KIDS ACTIVITIES BEGIN JUNE 24!

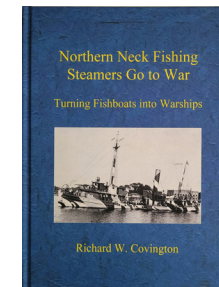

FRIDAY MORNING KIDS’ ACTIVITIES AT THE STEAMBOAT ERA MUSEUM

Children taking part in the museum’s first Friday morning activity of the 2022 season learned about the Steamboat Era through fun activities. Kids ages 4 to 12, accompanied by an adult learned about the history of how steamboats impacted the communities around the Chesapeake Bay.

In addition to learning about the Steamboat Era and building and testing a steamboat model, the program was expanded to include singalong songs, popular during the Steamboat Era, such as Row, Row Your Boat and Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star. Participants also played games popular during the Steamboat Era, 1813 - 1937, including jacks, pick-up sticks, Jacobs ladder and ball and cup.

While touring the Potomac Pilothouse, kids learned how busy the wharves were when the steamers arrived and the importance of steamboats to the communities on the Chesapeake Bay and its rivers. They saw photographs of the fashions of the day and explored the many chores children had during the Era. After the tours they decorated wooden steamboats and raced them in a pool on the museum’s front deck.

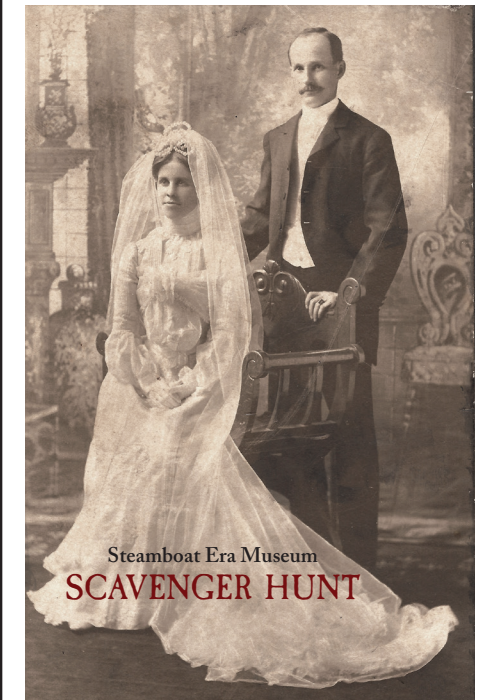

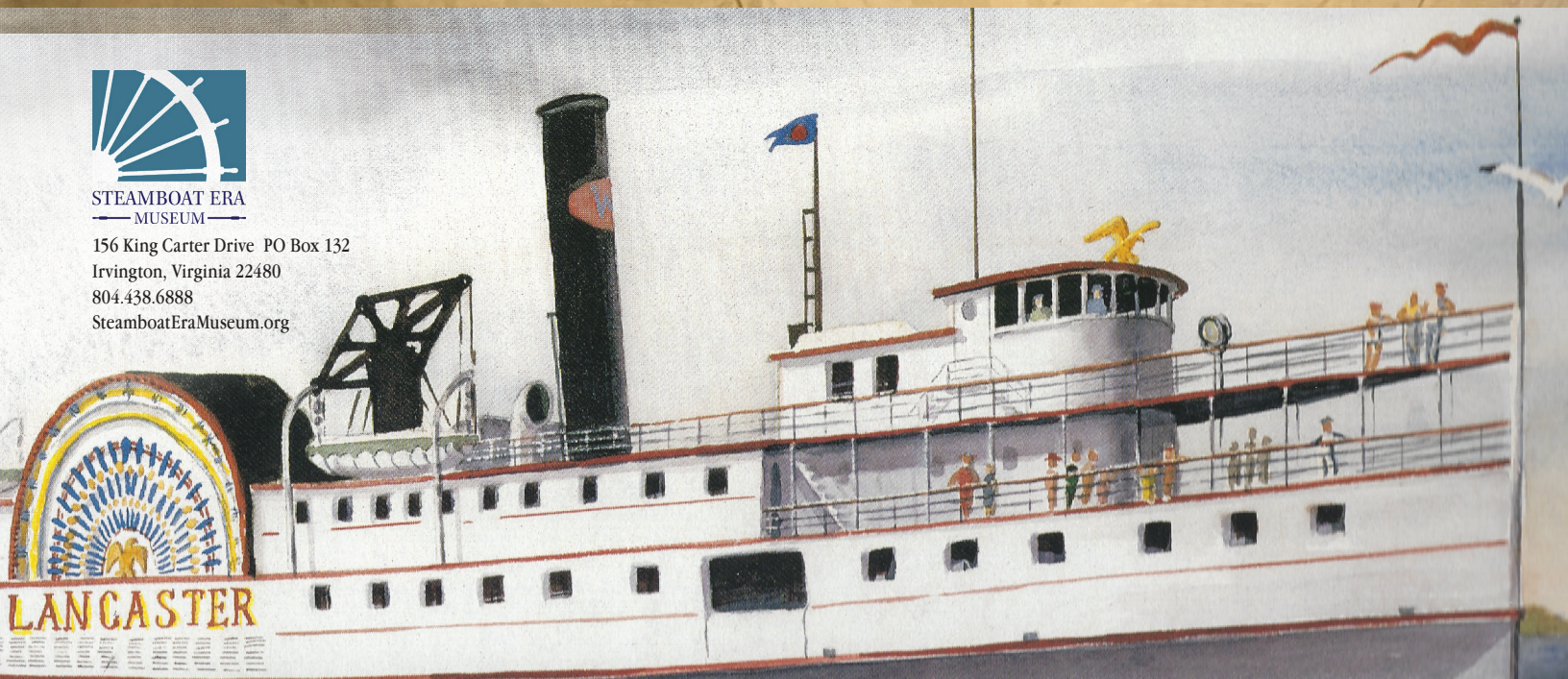
